MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Members,

GENEALOGY CORNER

Genealogy: A Picture is Worth a Thousand... Questions? (continued from previous newsletter) By Barb Bannon

When I continued my search to identify the remaining people in the Barber's Corners 1902 tornado picture, I was hoping to find an article in our newspapers covering the storm that could answer many questions No such luck, but I didn't get discouraged.

The website www.gendisasters.com lists storms, tornadoes and other disasters by location and year. Tornadoes hit ten different towns near here in 1902. This leads me to believe this was an active year here for storms, so it is probable that a fall tornado or cyclone could have occurred.

What the newspapers did reveal was that between June and October 1902 there were

many storms around this area. Flooding devastated Joliet and Lockport, the rushing water washed out bridges and sidewalks and undermined commercial buildings in the downtown. The lightning and wind assaulted the rural areas, damaging homes and destroying numerous barns and silos. Ads selling tornado and storm insurance multiplied in the classified sections, similar to current day "robo" calls we receive from repair companies after storms.

To find an Eipers family connection to Barber's Corners in Du Page Township, I next concentrated on old plat maps and the Federal Census for Will County, both proved very helpful. The 1909 plat map showed the Nicholas Eipers property near John Barber, Barber's Corners founder. From the 1900 through the 1940 Census I was able to gather the following. Nicholas was married to Anna (Gerasky), she passed away before 1910 and they had three daughters, Marguerite, Anna Belle and Juanita. He lived in the home at Rt. 53 and Barber's Corners Road and was owner and operator of the general store at that location.

A search of the LAHS cemetery readings showed Anna had died in 1904, just 6 months after having their fourth child Anthony, who also died in 1904. This all occurred just 2 years after the photo was taken. The reading also listed Nicholas death date as 1943 which enabled me to find his obituary and it stated he passed away after owning the "corner store" at Barber's Corners from 1899 until his death.

Turning my focus to the others in the photo, Clara (Mather) Hennes, the niece of Anna Eipers was not married until 1905. The men closest to her are too old to be her brothers but are possibly two of Anna's brothers or hired hands. The other two men, that look quite out of place in their three piece suits, could be damage adjusters or

the like. I may never be able to confirm the identity of these four men but this mystery photo has now told me much more about this family than only having survived a tornado.

Since Barbers Corners is located at Rt 53 and Boughton Rd, I've shared the photo with the Bolingbrook Historic Preservation Commission to give it more exposure in hopes someone can add to the story. With this accumulation of facts I was able to find family trees with even more information about this family and yet another photo. Those "thousand questions" this photo raised has now resulted in writing a "thousand words" to add to the family history.

A picture is worth a thousand words... Are you going to write them?

Vietnam Veteran Returns After 52 Years

This story caught my attention. It is about a US Air Force pilot, Colonel Roy Knight (unrelated to Pat), shot down in May 1967 during the Vietnam War. He was declared killed in action in 1974, posthumously awarded the Air Force Cross, Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross, Purple Heart and six Air Medals. On August 8, 2019, his body was returned to Texas and his family.

This is perhaps similar to other such stories, but ... wait until you know the rest of the story. Colonel Knight's body was returned to Love Field in Dallas. The pilot of the flight to Love Field carrying the casket was Southwest Airlines Captain Brian Knight, Colonel Knight's son. Love Field is the airport where Brian Knight, waved goodbye 52 years ago.

STEPPING BACK IN TIME by Susan Donahue

I am struck by the fact that those who began this Society pooled their money together as they struggled to realize their goal of creating a place where our rich Lemont history could be stored and shared. This is very evident in the material I will share with you.

January 5, 1971 Lemont Area Historical Society Minutes: Elaine Mathy brought up the subject of fundraisers. Ida Kaminski volunteered to organize and run a luncheon the end of January. Other ideas were a Square Dance and Bake Sale.

Tom Ludwig announced we have to make a commitment to the Methodist Church by November 1, 1971. An Executive Board was set up to make plans for this and to report back by the March Meeting. Anthony Slattery and Chester Davey are on the committee.

Bernice Johnson told of a donation of two children's coffins to the Society by Gerharz Funeral Home. They are hand carved wood and rather old. It was agreed to accept them. A discussion as to the safety of the building and artifacts followed. It was agreed every possible precaution was being taken to ensure their safety.

February 2, 1971 Minutes: It was reported that \$69 was realized as profit from the luncheon in January.

Mr. Ludwig reported that there was no progress as yet from the IRS – it is hoped to be received by March. He announced that \$48 will cover the building and contents.

Mrs. Mathy stated the following info was obtained to the installation of a telephone: \$15 installation fee: \$10.45 per month for service. It was felt these charges were too high for the limited use we would obtain from the phone.

Question of further fundraising was initiated. A "Square Dance", to be held at the Lemont Teen Club on a Saturday was

proposed. \$30 would be the fee paid to the caller; tickets would be priced at a \$1 or \$1.25 per person, so moved Mrs. Savage and seconded by Mr. Swanson that this action be put into motion. Motion carried. Committee appointed by President as follows: Mrs. Mathy, Chairman; Mrs. Hartman and Mrs. Davey as members.

Mrs. Hamelen reported that the Girl Scouts; Brownies; Cadets and a group of the Lithuanian School had toured the museum during the exhibit.

Members were invited to attend a lecture and film presented by Mrs. Hunington at St. Matthews Church on Wed, Feb 16, at 1:30pm. The talk will be entitled, "Shrines of American Presidents".
